

Sheryl MacKay



Sheryl has worked for the CBC across Canada since the early '80s and is delighted to be host of *North By Northwest*, the radio program that's all about creative people and the wonderful things they create. In addition to hosting her weekly show from the Maritime Heritage Centre on Saturday morning, Sheryl will be moderating a panel of writers on Friday evening.

These days when she's not on the air or travelling the province meeting creative British Columbians, Sheryl can be found at home by the Coquitlam River with her husband, three teenage children, and three dogs.

David Grierson



David Grierson has made a name for himself as an author, a jazz columnist, a television host and a radio personality. The creator of CBC Radio's North by Northwest, he went on to become the voice many of us wake up to five days a week as host of the daily morning show, On the Island.

A frequent juror for competitions in all fields of creative endeavour, Grierson was a charter member of the Writers' Guild of Canada, one of the founding members of the BC Chapter of the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences, until recently sat on the board of directors of the Vancouver Folk Music Festival and for reasons which continue to elude him, you'll find him listed in Canada's Who's Who.

David will host On the Island live from the Maritime Heritage Centre on Friday morning and moderate a panel of writers on Friday evening.




Canada Trust

Caroline Adderson



Caroline Adderson's first book, *Bad Imaginings*, was nominated for a 1993 Governor General's Award, the 1994 Commonwealth Book Prize and won the 1994 Ethel Wilson Fiction Prize. Stories from it have appeared in fifteen anthologies and been broadcast and adapted for radio. Her first novel, *A History of Forgetting* was nominated for the 2000 Rogers' Trust Fiction Prize and the 2000 Ethel Wilson Fiction Prize. It was also published in the UK. *Sitting Practice* is her second novel and is set, in part, on Vancouver Island. She has taught writing at UBC, the Banff Centre, Booming Ground and is currently a mentor in the Writing and Publishing program at SFU.

William Deverell



After overseeing more than 1,000 cases, William Deverell shifted from defending people charged with crimes to writing adventure thrillers. He won the \$50,000 Seal First Novel Award for Needles. His second book, High Crimes, was named Book of the Year by the Periodical Distributors of Canada. In all he has written ten critically-acclaimed novels including Mecca, The Dance of Shiva, and The Laughing Fountain. His single non-fiction book, Fatal Cruise – The Trial of Robert Frisbee, was praised by Margaret Cannon in The Globe and Mail. "From first page to last... the book is as compelling as any novel."

Deverell has also written five screen plays and was the creator of the CBC TV series, Street Legal. His twelfth novel, Mind Games, was released to

enthusiastic reviews last fall.

Steven Galloway



Steven Galloway was born in Vancouver, BC and raised in Kamloops. He holds a Masters degree in Creative Writing from the University of British Columbia, where he currently teaches fiction.


In addition to writing, he and his wife are involved in the running of a small winery in Langley, BC. Other interests include the restoration of player pianos, woodworking, barbequing, and shuffle-board.

He has worked as a waiter, forest fire fighter, carpet cleaner, theatre festival manager, jeans salesman, super-absorbent paper maker and horse wrangler. Of these seven jobs Steven claims to have been fired from three!

Galloway's first novel, Finnie Walsh, was a finalist for the Books in Canada First Novel Award. In 2003 he published his second novel, Ascension. In

addition to his public appearances at the festival, Steven will be conducting a workshop for aspiring writers on Sunday, March 28. (pre-registration required)

John Gould



John Gould is the author of two collections of very short stories, *Kilter* and *The Kingdom of Heaven*. His fiction has also appeared in chapbooks, and in periodicals across the country. He publishes occasional freelance nonfiction. John studied at the innovative Integrated Studies program at the University of Waterloo, where he holds a Bachelor degree. He has worked as an environmental researcher, a tree planter and a house framer. More recently he has turned to teaching fiction, and to coordinating arts programs. He co-created and ran the otherwords program at the BC Festival of the Arts, and is now the Executive Director of the Victoria School of Writing. He serves on the Editorial Board of the Malahat Review.

What's to be seen is not all figure skaters falling frame by frame. It is snow coming down like a million-billion ice hotels.



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
Words on Water

by Patrick Lane (2002)


A cursive blue above still water, a heron drifting north, a twist of smoke I follow as if in my solitude I could read his wings and understand the dawn. The far islands descend from the burning fog. born to the fires of the first sun. Three gulls pass over and leave their wings in sand, gray hieroglyphs only birds can understand. I watch an otter play in the wrack among the maze of kelp thrown up by storms. I have come to read the water as it touches the moon lost beyond the mountains of the Malahat. The heron passes and the otter retreats into the deep. I listen to thin cries as gulls disappear in flames. I think like me, the grey birds pray to the last of the gods.

What lorn poet prays to gods long gone from ocean's glistening wrack, what beach on edge of that deep book can offer comfort never found by parlour fire? If read he must why reads he not indoors, from tomes endited centuries afore, beaker full of the warm South close to hand? But no, this wind-swept gent ambles in the rain, shoes wet with punctuation from the sea, fishing for words in language known but to spectres lost to memory. Send him welcome, dry yourself, invite, come finger our shelves so proudly stacked with words on paper. Here will gulls keen and sea-creatures play while reader warms his haunch beside the grate. Here will flames read to us their living tongue, and speak the words that viewless wings have sung.

Madeleine Thien



Madeleine Thien was born in Vancouver. Her short stories and essays have appeared in literary journals and anthologies, including Best Canadian Stories, The Journey Prize Anthology, Islands West: Stories from the Coast, and Write Turns: New Directions in Canadian Fiction. She has also written and recorded for CBC Radio.

Simple Recipes, her first book of fiction, won the Ethel Wilson Fiction Prize and the City of Vancouver Book Award, was a finalist for the Commonwealth Writers' Prize for Best First Book (Canada and Caribbean region), and was named a notable book by the Kiriyama Pacific Rim Book Prize. The manuscript for this collection won the 1998 Asian Canadian Writers' Workshop's Emerging Writer Award. In

2001, Thien won the CAA Air Canada Award for most promising Canadian writer under the age of thirty.

Madeleine Thien lives in Vancouver, where she is at work on her first novel.

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Spider Robinson



Since he began writing professionally in 1972, Spider Robinson has won 3 Hugo Awards, a Nebula Award, the John W. Campbell Award for Best New Writer, the E.E. ("Doc") Smith Memorial Award (Skylark), the Pat Terry Memorial Award for Humorous Science Fiction, and Locus Awards for Best Novella and Best Critic. Twenty-four of his 29 books are still in print, in 10 languages.

Spider's most recent publications are the new novel Callahan's Con and the collection God is an Iron and Other Stories. Still in production are the novels The Free Lunch and Callahan's Key.

Spider was born in New York City on three successive days (they had to handle him in sections), and holds a Bachelors degree in English from the State University of New York. In 1992 he was the Toastmaster for the 50th

World SF Convention in Orlando. He was book reviewer for *Galaxy*, *Analog* and *New Destinies* magazines for nearly a decade, and currently writes occasional book reviews and a regular Op-Ed column, "Future Tense," for *The Globe and Mail*, Canada's national newspaper.

He has been married for 28 years to Jeanne Robinson. They have lived for the last 16 years in British Columbia, where they raise and exhibit hopes.

Erin Robinsong



Erin Skye Robinsong is from Cortes Island and lives in Victoria. She won the 2001 Irving Layton Award for Poetry at Concordia University, and has a BFA in Writing from the University of Victoria. She is an interdisciplinary artist working in text and visual performance. Her most recent works include *Do Not Touch The Axe*, a dance theatre piece with filmmaker Mark Vonesch, and a series of readings with live soundscapes performed by Megan Boddy.

Her written works have been described as "a landscape punctuated by things that fall from the sky, everything from a NASA space station to pianos to pickpockets in a prayer for the inescapable gravity of the state of earth."

A hand bound limited edition of her poetry, Ore, was published in 2003.

Erin will be accompanied by multi-instrumentalist Megan Boddy who is from Smithers, BC. Currently a member of the group "Honeygirl," she spent three years working for Tower Records in Sacramento, California, where she was a member of the Sacramento State University Women's Choir.

From its inception, Words on the Water has taken inspiration from the life and works of Campbell River writer, Roderick Haig-Brown. The festival aspires to contribute in some small way to keeping alive his memory and honouring his legacy to our community.
